1. Message from the Cathaoirleach of Dublin and Dun Laoghaire ETB

In the first place, I wish to congratulate the staff of Dublin and Dun Laoghaire Education and Training Board for their hard work and caring support of the 22,000 day students and 28,000 beneficiaries in Further Education and Training.

This annual report is the fifth since the establishment of the Education and Training Board in 2013. It provides a summary of provision in the area across the wide range of activity in schools, centres and services. I am happy to stand over the quality of the education and training provided. What we do for our learners and clients is central to our purpose and there have been demonstrable improvements over the year. A considerable effort was made in 2018 to ensure that the Financial Statements were submitted in a timely manner. We were happy to meet all our statutory requirements. Our Public Affairs Officer has continued to develop a programme of work with the Audit Committee. Risk Management through a developed risk register has assisted in addressing gaps and seeing that mitigation of risk is managed. The building programme is always a challenge and no more so than in 2018. There was a big need for temporary accommodation in a large number of schools. A number of large building projects suffered from some delays unfortunately. Swords Community College opened in September hosted by St. Finians Community College. This school will be established to cater for 1000 pupils in the coming years. I commend this report to you.

4. Organisation Support & Development (OSD)

The OSD strand of DDLETB continues to support the organisation in providing services in the functional areas of Finance, including payroll, HR, ICT and Corporate Services. Each of the functions consists of experienced staff who have extensive expertise and a wide range of skills. The demand of the support services is ever increasing with the continued growth of the organisation. During 2018, the programme of improvements within the OSD strand continued and included the following:

- Significant work in supporting the work of the Education Support Business Service (ESBS), which is being set up as a shared service for the ETB sector, with responsibility for payroll and finance. DDLETB will be one of the first ETBs to migrate to the national payroll function, anticipated for mid-2019
- Considerable progress towards full compliance with procurement regulations
- Administrative and technical support to the Board's large building/capital programme
- Enhanced and more time efficient recruitment process
- Development of a new learner payment system
- Enhancement of the governance framework
- Participation in a wide range of sectoral and public sector networks

DDLETB remains committed to the continuous improvement of its services through the revision of existing and identification of new business processes and systems.

5. Financial Summary

Dublin and Dun Laoghaire ETB is funded primarily by the Department of Education and Skills (DES) for the delivery of its primary level, second level and SOLAS and DES for further education and training programmes. In 2018, funding for particular projects was also provided by other Government Departments and Agencies including:

- Department of Children and Youth Affairs
- Department of Social Protection
- Department of Health
- State Examinations Commission
- South Dublin County Council
- Dun Laoghaire Rathdown County Council
- Higher Education Authority
- POBAL
- Leargas

Funds are also raised through charges for services such as tuition fees, rent of rooms and activities at local level. The Board's receipts for 2018 were €211,038,793. Dublin and Dun Laoghaire ETB is audited annually by the Comptroller and Auditor General (C&AG) who presents a report on the Board's financial stewardship to the Oireachtas. Of the total receipts last year, €7,950,317 was in respect of the Capital programme.

6. Key relationships

One of Dublin and Dun Laoghaire ETB's strategic priorities is to work in partnership with the major stakeholders in the three counties of Fingal, South Dublin and Dun Laoghaire-Rathdown. To this end, the ETB works closely with the Department of Education & Skills, SOLAS and QQI in the provision of its services. It collaborates with a range of public bodies and providers of training and education. For example, Dublin and Dun Laoghaire ETB is a member of the Local Community Development Committees (LCDC) of the County Councils of Fingal, South Dublin and Dun Laoghaire/Rathdown. The ETB worked closely with the local partnership companies as well as having representation on the Governing Bodies of the Institute of Technology Tallaght, the Institute of Technology, Blanchardstown and the Institute of Art, Design and Technology in Dun Laoghaire. Dublin and Dun Laoghaire ETB has an interagency agreement with Department of Employment Affairs and Social Protection. Through the Youth Service, the ETB cooperates with national youth organisations and local youth groups who are represented in the area. Community Training is funded through our Training Centres for Local Training Initiatives, Community Training Centres and specialist training providers.

In 2018, Dublin and Dun Laoghaire ETB co-operated with a large number of other organisations and institutions through the provision of teaching hours or financial assistance, such as:

Founded in local communities, our schools are child centred, inclusive, multi-belief, state supported primary schools providing a high quality primary education for every child in line with the National Primary School Curriculum laid down by the Department of Education & Skills. The schools enrolled 2,801 in 2018-2019.

Our Community National Schools benefit from their incorporation into DDLETB through the support network of Principals organised by Adrian Flynn. Finance, HR, Corporate Services and ICT all play a role in helping our Community National Schools benefit from involvement with the ETB. Each school also contributes to the ETBI CNS network which helps schools build their identity nationally. We appreciate the support of ETBI in this provision.



Post-Primary

The number of pupils in our Second level Schools continued to grow during the 2018 school year to 16,940. The year also saw the opening of our new school in the Swords area. Swords Community College opened its doors in September 2018. The Aonad in Luttrellstown Community College, called Coláiste na Tulchann, also opened.

DDLETB now has 29 Second level Community Colleges, four of which are Gael Choláistí, covering a large area of Dublin from Balbriggan around to Lucan, Tallaght and Firhouse. Our Community Colleges form an essential part of life and living throughout their local communities. They are inclusive and enable young people to meet their full potential in society. They empower students, teachers and parents to achieve educational progress in a positive and encouraging atmosphere.

Programmes being offered in our community colleges include -

- Junior Certificate
- Junior Certificate Schools Programme
- Transition Year
- Leaving Certificate
- Leaving Certificate Applied Programme
- Leaving Certificate Vocational Programme

The DEIS (Delivering Education Equality in School) programme is offered in 10 of our schools.

A range of supports and programmes were put in place to support teaching and learning in all of our schools during 2018 to include a CPD Programme for all middle leaders. Deputy Principal and Principal training was provided in key areas of provision with many new practices established in the areas of Special Education Provision, DEIS, English as an Additional Language, ICT as well as the ongoing support to existing networks such as the Literacy and Numeracy Network and the Teacher induction programme. The outcomes of the exemplary action research projects conducted through the TL 21 were published in the form of the booklet in partnership with NUI Maynooth. Schools have prepared their plans in line with the Department of Education and Skills Digital Strategy for Post-Primary Schools 2015-2020. This will enable them to plan for spending on ICT to match their targets in the plan.

Child Protection training for Boards of Management and key staff members was part of the ongoing programme of training conducted during 2018.

8. Further Education and Training (FET)

As part of our Further Education and Training (FET) provision a diverse range of programmes are delivered to a wide range of learners, including early and recent school leavers, adults returning to education/training, learners with disabilities, people in employment and those who are unemployed. In 2018; 21,620 learners commenced our courses, and a total of 28,408 learners benefitted from participation in a course.

Throughout 2018 DDLETB engaged in a comprehensive consultation process with stakeholders in the preparation and development of the Strategic Performance Agreement 2018-2020. A set of targets appropriate to the catchment area, capacity, economic & employment opportunities and social needs were defined. SOLAS and DDLETB participated in an iterative process of dialogue leading to the Strategic Performance Agreement being formally approved and signed in September 2018. The Agreement sets out the context, strategic priorities and DDLETB contribution to achievement of key national FET sector targets.

During 2018 DDLETB FET services made significant progress towards the achievement of our strategic goals as set out in the *Statement of Strategy 2017-2021*. We designed and delivered innovative programmes responsive to the needs of the business community under the national policies of *Skills to Advance* and *Traineeship*. We continue to build resources for teachers, instructors and leaders interested in Continuing Professional Development (CPD) in the area of Technology Enhanced Learning (TEL) in December 2018 an *Apple* Regional Training Centre was launched in collaboration with DDLETB. It provides courses to teachers to build the skills and confidence to use *Apple* technology in the classroom. Our third Technology-Enhanced Learning conference was hosted by Baldoyle Training Centre in September 2018 and was attended by more than 150 FET practitioners.





9. Youth and Sports Development Service

Introduction

DDLETB Youth and Sports Development Service provides a wide range of supports that enable the delivery and co-ordination of high quality educational, sporting, recreational and developmental programmes, projects and services to disadvantaged young people. Our operational values in providing our services are Equality, Collaboration, Innovation, Professionalism and Integrity. This is done in partnership with local communities, voluntary groups and voluntary youth organisations such as Crosscare, Foróige and YMCA.

Scope:

Programmes are delivered in line with the five National Outcomes of Better Outcomes Brighter Future (The National Policy Framework for children and young people 2014-2020)

Five National Outcomes for Children and Young People



Sample Actions:

Approximately 40,000 young people, 1850 volunteers and 190 staff support the delivery of Youth Work Programmes across the DDLETB Administrative Area.

Sample Achievements

- **Alternative Learning Programme (ALP) operated across five locations** i.e. Tallaght, Clondalkin, Dún Laoghaire, Balbriggan and Swords. 61 young people participated in the programme in 2018.
- **Dual Purpose Sports Centres**



The centres are located in Balbriggan, Phibblestown, Palmerston, Collinstown, Firhouse and Killinarden. Funding for the Dual Purpose Sport Centres is received from the Community Services Programme (CSP) Pobal, South Dublin County Council and Fingal County Council.

- **Sportivate (in conjunction with SDCC)**

Sportivate South Dublin is a joint initiative with SDCC and DDLETB with support from Sport Ireland. The programme caters for young people aged 18 and 25 and offers Sports and Recreation Studies: QQI Level 4 (Major Award) and certified workshops. 23 young people engaged with the Sportivate programme in 2018.

- **Active Youth Challenge (AYC)**

Delivery of The Active Youth Challenge to over 800 young people in the DDLETB area. 42 Groups completed the AYC in February 2018 with a further 45 groups registering to participate in October 2018.

- **Sailing Programme**

The sailing programme provides beginner and intermediate sessions for youth groups, summer projects and schools and benefits approximately 1000 young people. 64 youth groups participated in the sailing programme in 2018

10. Psychological Support Service

Introduction



The Psychological Support Service (PSS) is available to students in Second Level Schools, Youthreach Centres, and sectors of Further Education within Dublin and Dun Laoghaire Education Training Board (DDLETB). A broad range of psychological supports is provided in response to requests submitted by schools/centres. The PSS also offers short term support to staff working within DDLETB. At a systemic level, the PSS engages in research, training and ETB initiatives.

Scope

Service is provided by the PSS according to the resources available. Interventions by the team are directed towards:

- the provision of both direct and indirect support to students
- the resolution of behavioural, motivational, emotional and cognitive difficulties of individuals, through assessment and therapeutic intervention
- preventative work with target groups
- professional support of teaching staff, e.g. consultation
- in-service training in a range of areas
- staff support

Sample Actions

Approximately 594 staff engaged with the PSS for a range of purposes including consultation, in-service and support. Requests to the PSS regarding approximately 503 students were addressed through individual or group interventions. The work of the PSS also included collaboration with external agencies such as National Educational Psychological Service, City of Dublin ETB, University College Dublin, FRIENDS Resilience, and Hogan & Associates.

- Critical Incident response and training
- Trained staff as facilitators in the FRIENDS Resilience programme
- Provided advanced training in Standardised Testing for staff
- Supported delivery of Feuerstein's Instrumental Enrichment cognitive enhancement programme
- Delivered Reflective Practice Initiative
- Supported Guidance Counsellor, Learning Support, and Language, Literacy and Numeracy networks
- Suicide management and prevention using Collaborative Assessment and Management of Suicidality approach
- Mental Health training for staff
- Presentation to staff and students on Anxiety and Social Media
- Supported Staff
- Work Positive Initiative
- Differentiation Workshops
- Exploring Ethical Behaviour with staff
