1. Message from the Cathaoirleach of Dublin and Dun Laoghaire ETB

This annual report is the third since the establishment of the Education and Training Board in 2013. It provides a summary of provision in the area across the wide range of activity in schools, centres and services. As Cathaoirleach, I can attest to the quality of the education and training provided. Improving what we do for our learners and clients is central to our purpose. While resources provide a challenge I believe that the value provided in schools and centres is attributed to the massive effort of staff to live within existing funding. The non-pay deficit continued to grow during the year and presents an ongoing risk for the Board as it approaches €5 million. The continuing building programme is providing new and upgraded accommodation across the area. The most significant event in the year was the transfer of the six Community National Schools in our area. This increased our responsibility for over 2,000 new pupils in this Education and Training Board. The Minister relinquished patronage of the schools and allowed the Board become patron, following up a commitment made when the first schools were founded in 2007. The Board thanks the Department of Education and Skills and SOLAS for the resources and support they provide. I commend this report to you.

This 2016 Annual Report represents the achievement of significant progress in the development of the Education and Training Board. Among the milestones of importance was the full incorporation of the six Community National Schools into the organisation. The transition allowed the schools along with other Community National Schools to come fully under the Education and Training Board. These schools have a unique response to the need for diversity in Primary education providing cutting edge education.

Further Education and Training has moved on since last year and has responded well to the challenges to maintain and improving programmes. This has had implications for how Training Centres, Post Leaving Certificate Colleges and Adult Education Services work together. There has been great progress towards achieving the targets set out in the Further Education and Training Plan.

In schools, there has been a growth in student numbers with new schools ensuring a high quality education for the students whose parents have entrusted to us. There has continued to be major progress on the capital programme which led to the completion of works in a large number of schools. Collaborative networks in Leadership, Teaching and Learning, Special Needs, Language & Literacy, Information and Communications Technology have all helped to develop interactive approaches to the central purpose of classroom teaching and learning.

It has been a privilege for me to work with my colleagues among the staff over the past year. I am particularly grateful for the support of the board who have shown such an interest and commitment to their duties.

4. Organisation Services

The modernisation and upgrading of systems within the ETB’s Organisation Services continued in 2016. Despite the Public Sector moratorium on recruitment continuing throughout 2016, good progress was made with a programme of improvements. Included in the modernisation programme was implementing new e-business solutions and upgrading existing systems after a review of existing processes. The ETB remains committed to the continuous improvement of its services in the context of the Government’s Transformation of Public Services Programme.



5. Financial Summary

Dublin and Dun Laoghaire ETB is funded primarily by the Department of Education and Skills (DES) for the delivery of its second level and SOLAS and DES for further education and training programmes. In 2016, funding for particular projects was also provided by other Government Departments and Agencies including:

- Department of Children and Youth Affairs
- Department of Health
- Department of Social Protection
- Fingal County Council
- POBAL

Funds are also raised through charges for services such as tuition fees, rent of rooms and activities at local level. The Board's receipts for 2016 were €197,092,348. Dublin and Dun Laoghaire ETB is audited annually by the Comptroller and Auditor General (C&AG) who presents a report on the Board's financial stewardship to the Oireachtas. Of the total receipts last year, €9,464,137 was in respect of the Capital programme.

6. Key relationships

One of Dublin and Dun Laoghaire ETB's strategic priorities is to work in partnership with the major stakeholders in the three counties of Fingal, South Dublin and Dun Laoghaire/Rathdown. To this end, the ETB collaborates with a range of public bodies and providers of training and education. For example, Dublin and Dun Laoghaire ETB is a member of the Local Community Development Committees (LCDC) of the County Councils of Fingal, South Dublin and Dun Laoghaire/Rathdown. The ETB works closely with the local partnership companies as well as having representation on the Governing Bodies of the Institute of Technology Tallaght, the Institute of Technology Blanchardstown and the Institute of Art, Design and Technology in Dun Laoghaire. Through the Youth Service, the ETB cooperates with national youth organisations and local youth groups who are represented in the area. The National Learning Network remains a funded partner providing significant service in the community we serve. Local Training Initiatives and Community Training Centres are funded to provide opportunities for local responses in a targeted way.

In 2016, Dublin and Dun Laoghaire ETB co-operated with a large number of other organisations and institutions through the provision of teaching hours or financial assistance, such as:

7. Schools

Primary

The Minister for Education & Skills transferred the patronage of six Community National Schools to Dublin and Dun Laoghaire ETB with effect from 1st September 2016.

- Scoil Choilm, Porterstown
- Scoil Ghráinne, Phibblestown
- Scoil Chormaic, Balbriggan
- Citywest & Saggart CNS, Citywest
- Scoil Aoife, Tallaght
- Lucan CNS, Lucan

Founded in local communities, our schools are child centred, inclusive, multi-belief, state supported primary schools providing a high quality primary education for every child in line with the National Primary School Curriculum laid down by the Department of Education & Skills. The schools enrolled over 2,000 students in 2016-2017.

Post-Primary

The number of pupils in our second level Schools continued to grow during the 2016 school year. 2016 also saw the opening of our new school in the Kingswood area of Tallaght. In addition, DDLETB was awarded the patronage of two new schools, one in the Swords area and the other, Griffeen Community College, in partnership with Scoil Sínead, set to open their doors in September 2017. This was following a patronage campaign run during June 2016.

DDLETB now has 28 Second level Community Colleges (four of which are Gael Coláistí covering a large area of Dublin from Balbriggan around to Lucan, Tallaght and Firhouse. Our Community Colleges form an essential part of life and living throughout their local communities. They are inclusive and enable young people to meet their full potential in society. They empower students, teachers and parents to achieve educational progress in a positive and encouraging atmosphere.

Programmes being offered in our community colleges include -

- Junior Certificate
- Junior Certificate Schools Programme
- Transition Year
- Leaving Certificate
- Leaving Certificate Applied Programme
- Leaving Certificate Vocational Programme



The DEIS (Delivering Education Equality in School) programme is offered in 9 of our schools.

A full range of subjects including languages, the humanities, arts, technologies and science is offered at both junior and senior cycle. Students are encouraged to take part in all aspects of school life including extra-curricular activities like drama, music, debating, and sport

A large number of subject inspections took place in 2016 all of which can be accessed on the website of the Department of Education and Skills (DES) on www.education.ie. There was excellent practice observed in reports with enthusiastic teaching and very effective team teaching practices in place. Management support and meticulous planning were reported with teachers being especially commended for their extensive support for a wide range of co-curricular and extracurricular activities to support their subject. Peer-assessment and self-evaluation encouraged amongst students was noted along with subject planning using state examination information.

Whole School / Management Leadership and Learning (WSE- MLL) inspections took place in Adamstown Community College, Skerries Community College, Luttrellstown Community College and Donabate Community College. These Inspection reports found clear vision and strong commitment from both staff and Boards of Management in relation to teaching and learning with the quality of teaching noted as very good to excellent in many cases. Along with the implementation of new initiatives, in particular in the area of ICT, exemplary SEN provision was noted in all cases. Leadership and management teams were commended.

A range of supports and programmes were put into place to support teaching and learning in all of our schools during 2016 to include a CPD Programme for all middle leaders. Deputy Principal and Principal training was provided in key areas of provision with many new practices established in the areas of Special Education Provision, DEIS, EAI, ICT as well as the ongoing going support to existing networks such as the Literacy and Numeracy Network and the TL 21 Programme (Teaching and Learning for the 21st Century). The outcomes of the exemplary action research projects conducted through the TL 21 were published in the form of the booklet in partnership with NUI Maynooth.

Child Protection training for Boards of Management as part of the ongoing programme of training for Boards was conducted during 2016.





8. Further Education and Training

Scope of FET Provision in DDLETB

DDLETB's FET provision offers full and part-time courses across a wide range of fields to a large and diverse population of post second level learners. Programmes include Adult Literacy, Apprenticeship, Blended Learning, Bridging and Foundation, BTEI, Community Education, Community Training Centres, ESOL, Evening Training, FET Cooperation Hours, ITABE, Justice Workshops, Local Training Initiatives, PLC, Skills for Work, Specialist Training, Specific Skills Training, Traineeship Training, VTOS and Youthreach.

9. Youth and Sports Development Service

Introduction

DDLETB Youth and Sports Development Service aims to provide a wide range of supports that enable the delivery and co-ordination of high quality educational, sporting, recreational and developmental programmes, projects and services to disadvantaged young people. This is done in partnership with local communities, voluntary groups and voluntary youth organisations such as Crosscare, Foróige and YMCA and we have strong history of collaboration with local county councils. The Youth and Sports Development Service also provides a number of directly managed targeted programmes.

Youth Work is a planned programme of education to enhance the personal and social development of young people which is complementary to their formal, academic or vocational education and training.

Scope

All programmes were delivered in line with the five National Outcomes of Better Outcomes Brighter Future (The National Policy Framework for children and young people 2014-2020)

- Active and Healthy, physical and mental wellbeing
- Achieving full potential in all areas of learning and development
- Safe and protected from harm
- Economic security and opportunity
- Connected and Respected and contributing to their world

DDLETB Youth and Sports Development Service has representation on local committees engaged in the development of action plans to address key objectives and outcomes of National Government Policy such as National Drug Strategy 2009-2016; Better Outcomes Brighter Futures 2014-2020 and the National Youth Strategy 2015-2020. Committees include Child and Young People's Services Committee, Comhairle na nÓg, Local Drugs Task Force and Local Sports Partnership.

Sample Actions

Some examples of the many and varied activities included:

- Summer Projects
- Outdoor Pursuits
- Sailing Programme
- Youth Cafés
- Youth Clubs
- Youth Information Centres
- Computer Clubhouse



Some examples of DDLETB directly managed targeted programmes included:

- **Active Youth Challenge**

The Active Youth Challenge asks youth clubs/groups/schools to meet a set of standards of 12 hours of physical activities in 12 weeks to be eligible for the DDLETB Active Youth Challenge Award. Activities and attendance for each activity session must be recorded by Activity Coordinators in the logbook provided. In 2016, 771 young people from 7 schools and 36 youth groups engaged with the AYC. Some examples of the wide variety of activities engaged in are fitness circuits, sailing, kayaking and tag rugby.

- **Sportivate (in conjunction with South Dublin County Council)**

This programme caters for participants primarily between the ages of 18 and 25 who are interested in breaking into the sports industry in some capacity or furthering their educational opportunities. Participants undertake a programme of education which includes Sports and Recreation Studies FETAC Level 4. Additional workshops include Disability Inclusion, Taste of Sailing, Healthy Eating and Athletics Leadership.

- **Alternative Learning Programme**

The ALP is an interim educational programme for young people aged between 12 and 16 years who have encountered difficulties in coping with mainstream education and consequently are not currently attending school on a regular basis. ALP is operating from five sites within the DDLETB area; Dún Laoghaire, Swords, Clondalkin, Tallaght, Balbriggan.

- **Dual Purpose Sports Halls– Phibblestown, Killinarden, Firhouse, Collinstown , Palmerston**

The Dual Purpose Sports Centre Programme aims to open these state of the art facilities to both partner second level schools, local National Schools, Community and Youth Services.

- **Sailing (in conjunction with Baltinglass Outdoor Education Centre)**

Based in the Marine Activity Centre in Dun Laoghaire harbour, the sailing programme provides beginner and intermediate sessions for youth groups, summer projects and schools. Approximately 800 young people engaged with the sailing programme in 2016.

Sample Achievements

- Active Youth Challenge delivered to over 771 young people across 7 schools and 36 youth groups.
- 14 young people participated in the Sportivate programme completing a programme of education which included Sports and Recreation Studies QQI Level 4.
- Over 3,500 volunteers and over 45,000 young people involved with the service in 2016.
- 510 Youth Clubs and 113 Youth Projects.



10. Psychological Support Service

Introduction

The Psychological Support Service (PSS) is available to students in Second Level Schools, Youthreach Centres, and sectors of Further Education within Dublin and Dun Laoghaire Education Training Board (DDLETB). A broad range of psychological supports is provided in response to requests submitted by schools/centres. The PSS also offers short term support to staff working within DDLETB. At a systemic level, the PSS engages in research, training and ETB initiatives.

Scope

Service is provided by the PSS according to the resources available. Interventions by the team are directed towards:

- the provision of both direct and indirect support to students
- the resolution of behavioural, motivational, emotional and cognitive difficulties of individuals, through assessment and therapeutic intervention
- preventative work with target groups
- professional support of teaching staff, e.g. consultation
- in-service training in a range of areas
- staff support
- the professional placement of Trainee Psychologists

Sample Actions

Approximately 375 staff engaged with the PSS for a range of purposes including consultation, in-service and support. Requests to the PSS regarding approximately 326 students were addressed through individual or group interventions. The work of the PSS also included collaboration with external agencies such as NEPs, City of Dublin ETB, University College Dublin, and Insight Matters.

- Delivered Reflective Practice Initiative
- Provided training in Standardised Testing for staff
- Supported Guidance Counsellor, Learning Support, and LLN networks
- Launched Mental Health Initiative
- Provided training for Youthreach staff concerning students with Autistic Spectrum Disorder
- Delivered workshops to Youthreach staff concerning Special Educational Needs
- Presentation to staff and students on Anxiety and Social Media
- Supported Staff concerning Managing Change
- Supported Staff concerning Gender Identity Awareness
