On behalf of the Senor Leadership Team, I would also like to take the opportunity to wish you and your families a Happy Easter.




ETHOS

Rath Dara Community College Careers Speed Event

On 24th February 2023, Rath Dara CC held a hugely successful "Future Pathways Careers Speed Event".

This event represented over 40 different career paths. Ninety exhibitors volunteered their time and expertise to inspire and raise the expectations of our students at Rath Dara CC. Our exhibitors included large multinationals, local SME's, further education providers, business owners, community organisations, public representatives, and the public sector.

We were delighted to welcome back many past pupils, who happily agreed to and enthusiastically participated in this event. We were immensely proud to see the diverse and successful pathways our students had followed. Pathways including accountancy, multinationals, childcare, the armed forces, Gardai, pilots, business owners, zoology, education, and contractors. This was a fantastic opportunity to reconnect with our alumni. The event was opened by Minister Roderic O'Gorman, who participated in this event along with local TD Paul Donnelly and local councillor Mary Mc Camley. DDLETB's Director of schools, Nichola Spokes headed up a contingency from the DDLETB Development Support Team.

This was a fun event where pairs of students spent 4 minutes at a selection of the 40 stations. talking to exhibitors. For the last 15 minutes of the event, we allowed free time for students to visit exhibitors that they may have had an interest in. Most exhibitors brought promotional gifts, which of course went down a treat!

This event we hoped, would open our pupil's eyes to their own career potential. The driving force behind this event was to guide students towards different career pathways and raise their expectations. We wanted to provide a setting for our pupils to engage with relevant careers and an opportunity to build their own self confidence. We hoped that meeting former pupils would allow our students to see the possibilities of what they can achieve and inspire them to work hard to achieve their full potential.











Preparation for the event included students researching the exhibitors, their companies, and their career paths. Students collaborated with the project team to create questions. The project team worked closely with our SEN\EAL students to create teams and personalised questions that would enable full participation in the event.

We wanted to re-engage with our local community and promote our school. This event afforded us an opportunity to strengthen and develop, fruitful and lasting partnerships with local business and our community.

We hope that our exhibitors enjoyed meeting our pupils. The atmosphere on the day was electric and was captured by our digital leader and the DDLETB support team. Child Protection and Online Safety Event

DDLETB, Tusla, An Garda, and Webwise Team Up to support Principals and SPHE coordinators.



In today's digital age, children are exposed to various online risks such as cyberbullying, online predators, and exposure to inappropriate content.

It's essential to educate students, school staff and parents/guardians about the importance of child protection and online safety.

We were delighted here in DDLETB to join forces with Tusla, An Garda Síochána, and Webwise to provide a comprehensive presentation on child protection and online safety as part of our Post Primary Principal's meeting in January.

We were joined by Glenda Mc Cormack a Principal Social Worker from Tusla, Ireland's Child and Family Agency, Detective Sargent Cathy Curtin from an An Garda Síochána's Online Child Exploitation Unit, and Jane Mc Garrigle project worker from Webwise the Irish national internet safety awareness centre. Throughout the morning the different speakers highlighted for school leaders and their SPHE coordinators, the potential risks that students may face while using the internet, how to go about reporting a concern, the importance of safeguarding, and crucially the resources and training that is available to support teachers in delivering comprehensive Online Safety programs as part of SPHE/RSE and Wellbeing programs in their schools.





Webwise Supports

The team at Webwise has put together many internet safety teaching resources addressing a range of topics including cyberbullying, image-sharing, social media, online safety and more. **Internet** Safety Resources: Get free lessons on cyberbullying (webwise.ie) they also highlight the STAR SEND Toolkit | Childnet which supports the teaching of online safety to students with special educational needs and disabilities.

These resources including advice, lessons, videos and presentations are available to teachers, schools and organisations for free and can be used to help young people learn all they need to know about using social media and the internet in a safe, secure and positive way. **Teachers** - (webwise.ie) Advice for Teachers Archives - Webwise.ie

Webwise also provide comprehensive up to date information and supports for parents who have a vital role in the education, protection and welfare of their children. It's important for parents

and guardians to have open and honest conversations with their children about online safety and especially the emerging trend in self-generated imagery, online predators, exposure to inappropriate content and the potential risks associated with these.

Webwise's resources provides advice on how to talk to children about these sensitive topics and how to minimise the risk of them creating or sharing selfgenerated imagery and what to do if they have a concern. **Guides for Parents** on Cyberbullying, Filtering and more (webwise.ie) Parents - (webwise.ie)

Learning can only happen if ALL students feel included and feel that they belong in our school communities. This climate of belonging allows for Excellence in Education. The image below depicts inclusion "Walk a mile in my shoes" focussing on empathy and tolerance – a project carried out this year in Skerries CC. Also, their display spelling out what Diversity means in their school.



Valuing essential aspects of our students' identity shows they are welcome and belong in our school communities. Visual displays featuring other languages spoken by our school communities are important, so students don't feel they have to leave who they really are at the door of our schools. Excellence is evident across DDLETB post primary schools when we work to support students from a refugee or migrant background in the following ways:

- The assessment of 780+ EAL students each academic year across DDLETB schools. This generates valid and reliable computergenerated data to know who needs support in their learning of mainstream subjects. This data also enables our schools to provide Excellence in Education in every DDLETB classroom. Who needs support in YOUR classroom? How are you helping them?
- We share examples of Excellence in Education from our schools at our Network meetings. We learn from each other.
- The reading competition shows students' Excellence in Education. The competition is based on tracking effort and improvement in language skills from one academic year to the next. It identifies and showcases our students' active learning.
- We ensure teachers who teach EAL have access to internationally recognised certification so our students can reach their lifelong learning goals and have choices in relation to career paths when they leave our schools. We have high expectations for ALL our students to achieve.
- We ensure subject teachers have access to training (CLIL training - Content and Language Integrated Learning. European Language Label 2011) to allow them to support the language and literacy development of all students in their classrooms.

Our ETB Hero Jack McFadden



Training started at 5 am, five days a week, and then I had galas at the weekend. I was always aiming to beat my personal best. But I always managed to balance my swimming commitments with my academic work

Jack was a student in the Croi ASD class for 6 Years in Colàiste Pobail Setanta and graduated in May 2021. Jack is on the ASD spectrum and also has Dyslexia.

Jack accessed all his classes in Croi for the 1st three years of his post-primary education. With the support of the School leaders, staff and students and in particular his SEN Coordinator Frances Shannon and his SNA. He then attended Transition. Year in mainstream and went on to sit 6 Leaving

Certificate subjects with the additional difficulties of the recent pandemic.

Jack graduated in May 2021 and is currently a student at Trinity College Dublin.

Jack is a prime example of how our students over time progress from intense scaffolding in the Croi classroom (or support classrooms) in their earlier years to mainstream in Senior Cycle supported by SNA and SET hours.



Jack is a dedicated swimmer and not only did he excel academically, but he also excelled in his sporting endeavours. Jacks dedication and hard work took him to the 2019 Special Olympics in Abu Dhabi, where he went on to win two Gold medals and one bronze medal for the 100m and 200m breaststroke.

Jack began swimming when he was four years old and joined the Special Olympics club Phoenix Flyers in Coolmine, back in 2014. He believes that swimming has taught him the benefits of life, how to deal with failure and setbacks, and how to be part of a team.



"All of these things that I have achieved were with the help of my family, friends, teachers, school community, teammates and peers".



For me, I have seen my confidence grow, and I have developed resilience and independence through my hard work and dedication to the sport

The entire DDLETB community is very proud of Jack's academic and sporting achievements.

On March 3rd at ETB Day celebrations Jack was celebrated as 1 or 5 chosen ETB Hero's.

Jack embodies Colaiste Pobail Setanta's 3 Core values of Brod. Misneach and Meitheal and is a wonderful ambassador for our ETB core values.

We are delighted and proud to present our ETB Hero, Jack McFadden.




ETB Day - Croke Park, Dublin



The community of Coláiste de hÍde recently undertook a project to explore their school identity and values.

On the 18th of January, thanks to funding from the Tallaght Fund/Síol Foundation, a wonderful mural depicting these values and identity was launched.

The importance of community was the driving energy of this project.

A whole school committee was formed which applied for successful funding from the Tallaght fund/síol foundation. Last year's Transition Year students took part in a series of workshops on street art and graffiti design with Creative Connections and the talented artist Kevin Bohan.

There was extensive planning and discussion regarding the theme and the collaboration between the artist and the students was paramount in creating the magnificent piece in the heart of the school. The full year group were involved in the conceptual stages of idea-generation and design development. Adamstown Community College BT Young Scientist 2023

Al - energy is a project initially created to take part at BT Young Scientists and Technology exhibition. The aim was to try to increase the efficiency of a new type of battery cell, an air-aluminium cell. This cell would use oxygen, water and aluminium as the fuel for electricity production.

The idea appeared after watching a video from the internet. Most modern batteries use rare earth metals in their construction whereas both air and aluminium are almost limitless resources. As a result of months of work, I was able to achieve my aims and find a way to improve this type of cell by using chemical and physical methods.

After all the effort put into the project I was delighted to win two awards in the BT Young Scientist and Technology Exhibition 2023. The first one was the STRIPE student award for best project in Chemical, Physical and Mathematical category.

The second award was runner-up in the BT Young Scientist Individual Award. It would not have been possible to complete the project without external help. I am extremely grateful to my parents who supported me morally and financially through all that year.

Also I am thankful to my Principal, Mr. Dave Anderson and Adamstown Community College for materials provided and logistical help. Lastly I would like to express my gratitude to Mr. Sean O'Donnell, my physics and coordinator teacher and both Mr. Lynch and Miss. Halloran for their help and guidance during the work.

Even though the exhibition is over, it does not mean that the work on this idea has stopped. This project has grown far beyond initial boundaries.

Comic Book Heroes


Our General Learning Level 2 group were all referred to us by an organisation, Prosper Fingal, who support those with intellectual disabilities. This group spent a year together, building their skills in literacy, technology and learning to learn.

Moving to a Level 2 programme that has learning outcomes and expectations can be challenging but this year supported them to get ready and set their goals.

Teamwork, collaboration and integration of modules and learning outcomes create a better learning environment for learners, especially for those with disabilities and through brainstorming, facilitation and looking at shared interests, the group decided to integrate the Reading, Writing and Listening and Speaking modules and meet the learning outcomes through the medium of art by creating a comic book.

The group brought in some old magazines and worked on a story board to support a comic book strip. It was a collaborative effort where; through words and imagery everyone was encouraged to add a piece.

To give an example of how they created their ideas, they were talking about their journey to our centre on the bus and the tutor used this idea to use hyperbole (exaggerating statements) by adding villains and heroes to encourage expansion of selective attention.







The tutor noted that there was a direct increase in focused thought, words and listening skills. This gave us more confidence that this concept would work as we could measure the progress while keeping the learning outcomes in mind. While using a creative approach to meet the learning outcomes, the learners progress showed focus, engagement and evidence of real transferrable skills. This benefits their daily living and independent progression giving them real opportunities to move forward in their lives and education.

The tutor, Gillian, used the comic book idea to look at both bizarre and everyday situations for inspiration and education with the intention of emulating a sense of well-being and safety among the learners, creating confidence in their individual learning abilities and personal growth.

Learning outcomes were integrated between the different modules and to gather the non-tangible aspects to the class, the tutor kept her own reflective journal which helped to address the outcomes of the Listening and Speaking element. The learners worked on different forms of writing which included research, journaling and reflection.

They used reading strategies to research narratives and ideas. They brainstormed regularly, creating posters and collages. They had discussions, formed opinions, listened to others, improved their focus and attention and looked at non-verbal communication. They had one-to-one informal reviews and peer group discussions to discuss progress.

Overall, the intention was to create briefs and tasks around a concept that would not overcomplicate their natural desire to learn but show their natural progression and individual development organically. To specifically meet the criteria and learning outcomes, the learners kept a weekly reflective journal which was both written and visual where they worked on their vocabulary, writing and spelling. They used technology to research ideas, images etc. and used relevant texts for reading purposes. They completed story boards, created posters and mind maps and recorded discussions and reflections.

Finding new and innovative ways of engaging our learners ensures diversity and inclusion and while we ended up with a wonderful comic book and three completed QQI Level 2 modules, the learning for both the participants and the teacher went far beyond this and will better inform our teaching and learning going forward.

The LIFT Programme

LIFT Ireland is a non-profit organisation and social enterprise aimed at increasing the level of positive leadership in Ireland. Founded in late 2017, the movement was officially launched in May 2018 at LIFT OFF, an inaugural event attended by some of Ireland's foremost leaders in business, arts, education, and sport. LIFT, which stands for 'Leading Ireland's Future Together', was built on a desire to change the country for the better by changing the way people view leadership. It aims to do this through its eight-part, group learning process. LIFT Ireland is a social enterprise aimed at increasing the level of positive leadership in Ireland.

Those considered for the **Dominick Lewis Excellence in Leadership Award** are all people who believe in helping others to reach their potential and grow. The requirements to be a nominee are that these people live the LIFT values, empower others, run LIFT roundtables consistently and think outside the box to embed LIFT to bring about change.

Dominick was a key part of bringing LIFT to life both in industry and the education sector. He continues to inspire all of the LIFT Ireland team. Everyone who knew him thought of him as an incredible leader who empowered others. He passed away too soon, and this award was created in his memory.





Youthreach Clondalkin introduced the LIFT program in 2019 and have been using it continuously since then. It is incorporated into our Language, Literacy and Numeracy plan.

All of our learners participate in the weekly sessions called Round Tables. LIFT looks at ten different values which include Listening, Positive Attitude, Respect, Competence, Determination, Empathy and Understanding, Resilience, Accountability, Honesty & Integrity and Innovation & Adaptability.

The program allows for analysis and reflection in each of the values as well as deriving strategies to improve on these values. In 2021 LIFT was imbedded into our Teamwork Level 4 QQI module and our Customer Services Level 4 module, which have both been successfully Externally Authenticated by QQI.

Youthreach Clondalkin was awarded the Living Lift Award in 2020 and again at The LIFT Ireland awards ceremony on Thursday 9th of February 2023. This award is given in recognition of Living LIFT and strengthening leadership in our organisation. We are also a recognised partner of LIFT Ireland.

Centre Resource person Antoinette Nolan was nominated for The Dominick Lewis Excellence in Leadership Award and was shortlisted and as one of the final three possible recipients.

At the Awards Ceremony on February 9th, 2023, Antoinette won this prestigious award. We are delighted for Antoinette and congratulate her on her well-deserved achievement.
