TLP PROJECT OF THE YEAR AWARDS:

The symbol of the paper aeroplane is used to identify the Leadership Connect programme. It is symbolic of gaining new perspectives and for the TLP project it's about the journey and not the destination. This year's programme saw 30 teams take on projects which ranged from student voice, wellbeing, developing confidence, improving mental health and physical health and everything in between. Each team gave generously of their time and commitment to ensure a positive impact on their learners and school communities. The criteria for selection was based on four categories.

- 1. Impact on learner/school community
- 2. Engagement with Programme
- 3. Contribution/teamwork/ team development
- 4. Links to school development/ statements of learning



In third place was the TLP Team from Rath Dara, led by their facilitator Craig Cunningham. This project put student wellbeing at the heart of their work, which aimed to enhance teaching and learning through mental and physical health and whose outcome was a number of incredible efforts to make positive connections within the school community.





In second place led by their facilitator Ross Murray was the Scoil Ghrainne CNS team. This project which put student voice at the heart of their work and aimed to build on the sense of community and encourage a shared experience within the student body by establishing a student council.



In first place led by their facilitator Mairin Brady, was the Fingal Community College TLP Team. This project looked at student experience and attitude to exams and aimed to encourage students to be independent and reflective learners and support them in alleviating nerves and anxiety.



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FINGAL COMMUNITY COLLEGE

Fingal Community College are no strangers to the Leadership Connect Programme. Many of us have participated in the MLP programme over the past number of years. In 2019/20 we engaged with the TLP programme and led by Kate Urell we worked on a Parental Engagement initiative. Covid-19 interrupted our plans, but the resources we created then are still in use to this day. We were delighted to be involved in the programme again this year and are very grateful for all the support we have received along our journey.

When we first met, we all agreed that whatever we worked on, our students had to be at the centre of everything we did. We spoke to our students and asked them for ideas. Many of them were worried about the disruption caused by Covid-19 and one issue that came up again and again was a concern about coping with exams. Students also said that they struggled with knowing how to revise for tests. Our SSE strand was focused on differentiated classwork, so our TLP team decided to try to create a resource that could be used in all subjects which would expose students to challenging tasks that would promote reflection and independent learning.

It was important to us that students and staff were involved in the creation of the resource. We consulted several teachers, SNAs and our 5th Year prefects. We received lots of feedback which helped us adapt the resource accordingly before we sent it to print. We printed large posters and stuck them up in every classroom. We also shared the resource electronically using MS Teams. We surveyed staff and carried out focus groups with students towards the end of our project timeline as it is important to us that the resource remains useful to staff and students in the future. Our students gave us some fantastic feedback and made some suggestions on how we can improve the checklist for future use. We are taking all of their feedback on board and are adapting the resource to be used by students at home. The TLP programme runs for a relatively short period of time, but the impact of the project can last a lot longer.

Involvement in the TLP programme is so much more than the project you are working on. The various homework tasks and General Learning Sessions are extremely valuable forms of professional development. Our introductory video and action planning sessions made us stop and think carefully about why we got involved in this programme and what we hoped to achieve. Creating our school Ecology afforded us a chance to reflect on the huge amount of work that goes on in our school and how it is all interconnected. Noel Kelly's Leadership session gave us practical advice on interview technique and becoming comfortable with speaking positively about our accomplishments. In the Reflective Leadership session, lan Molloy helped us to consider what type of leaders we are and what our hopes are for the future. John Cronin helped us reflect on our school culture and reminded us that it is ok to make mistakes while Joy Ui Mhurchadha took us through the various elements of leadership which support school development.

At times our TLP journey was a little bumpy. Finding time to meet as a team was a challenge and like many school staff we were under huge pressure during the winter months. We worked very well as a team however and used MS Teams to collaborate online. We supported each other when the going got tough and we hit a few speed bumps. At all times we kept the students to the forefront of our minds and our goal of helping and supporting them kept the project on the road. As John Cronin reminded us all back in February....'working hard for something we don't careabou t is called stress; working hard for something we love is called passion.'

We are very grateful to the Senior Management Team in DDLETB for facilitating the TLP programme and to our own SMT and our colleagues in Fingal Community College for encouraging us to get involved and supporting our work in school. We are incredibly inspired by the work of Caroline Daly and the whole Development Team and don't take for granted the amount of planning and preparation that goes into making the programme such a success story. 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MIDDLE LEADERSHIP PROGRAMME

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This was the first year of the redeveloped Middle Leadership Programme We were delighted with the level of interest and the success of the programme.

Early last year we carried out extensive primary research into what was then the Middle Leadership Development Programme. Participants from various years were asked to complete a detailed survey, the results were collated, and a report was presented to our Senior Management Team. Based on these findings and recommendations we designed and developed this new year-long programme with an aim to increasing collaboration, leadership capacity and learning opportunities for participants.

This year, 57 participants took part in 7 MLP sessions and 2 (additional and optional) Leadership Connect Sessions. They were provided with a Leadership Connect Journal and the tools to aid reflection of their learning experiences. Sessions covered various topics from Leadership to Curriculum Planning, Organisational Skills to dealing with Stress and Anxiety and Emotionally Intelligent Leadership to Teamwork Skills. Participants demonstrated huge commitment and collaboration through-out the year and feedback on this new programme has been hugely positive. I would like to personally thank participants for making the programme such an enjoyable and collegial experience.

The SSE Coordinators Network met in Head Office on 9th May for a great day of sharing and discussion on all things SSE related.

Sean Smyth, Principal of Grange CC began our day looking at "The role of the Coordinator in Schools", particularly in relation to new people who may have taken up the role recently. Mary Murphy, Deputy Principal, Kingswood CC, and her colleague Oide Eilish, brought us through a case study showing a 3-year SSE cycle explaining how they implemented "Universal Design for Learning (UDL) as a Whole School Endeavour". Mark Fennell, (Educational consultant and lecturer in Education, Maynooth University) explored the concept of "SSE and School Improvement Planning". Participants engaged in conversations about engaging staff in the process, gathering and using data effectively and using evidence of practice in the classroom as the basis for decision-making.

Peter Whitty, Deputy Principal, Colaiste Pobail Setanta, led the afternoon session, on "Planning for SSE in Our Schools 2022/2023. Familiarisation of the DES requirements in relation to Wellbeing will be a major focus for schools in the coming year. Peter outlined the resources available at present and set us on the right path for our SSE considerations for next year.

Eanna Ó Brádaigh from Apple Education, led us through a light-hearted but thought-provoking session on 'Leading All Staff members in Change".

Many thanks to all the SSE Coordinators for attending and participating on the day and to the SSE Focus Group for their work throughout the last year in leading and developing SSE for all schools and colleges across DDLETB.

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COLÁISTE POBAIL SETANTA OUR SCHOOL SELF EVALUATION JOURNEY, 2021/22 "STUDENT SUPPORT HUBS"

In Coláiste Pobail Setanta we recognised that challenges arose in our school as a result of the pandemic, we felt that some students did not engage in remote learning and that teachers found it difficult to teach aspects of the curriculum on-line. With this in mind, we made a decision to use the SSE process to address some of the challenges that our school faced in the context of the pandemic. Together with our Senior Leadership Team, we created the concept of 'Support Hubs'. The aim of the Support Hubs was to provide a dedicated week to offer support in a part of the curriculum that departments identified as a key area or skill that students may have missed out on during the last two years. We planned to hold three Support Hub weeks across the academic year, one each semester. Departments came together to identify the needs of their students and to agree appropriate content to deliver to each year group. We asked teachers to use data available, such as CAT4 scores and teacher knowledge, to focus on differentiation to ensure we were engaging all students. We hoped that during our Support Hub weeks, classes in each year group would be covering the same topic or skills and that ultimately students felt supported.

We ran our first Support Hub in October and our second in January. Our students took part in activities across the school that aimed to support or close any gaps in their learning. We had great examples across all departments of student engagement and Twitter was abuzz with examples of teaching and learning. Following both Support Hubs, our Planning for Learning Team collected feedback from the school community, our students, teachers and parents. We sent surveys and established a focus group through the Student Council. The feedback was invaluable and gave us some great data and areas for improvement and development that helped inform our planning for future Support Hubs.

We are looking forward to our final Support Hub after the Easter Break, where we have an opportunity to return to some teaching practises that we have been unable to do this year due to Covid restrictions. As our academic year draws to a close and teachers and students are focusing on exams, we are hoping that this week will be an engaging week of group work and active learning strategies and that our students will have benefitted from the initiative but also felt part of our SSE journey this year.

CELEBRATE OUR ETHOS STUDENT COMPETITION

This year our work on implementing the ETB Ethos Framework was conducted with four pilot schools: Balbriggan Community College, Castleknock Community College, Ériu Community College and Lucan Community College. Our aim for the year was to raise awareness among these school communities.
