## ETB PATRON'S FRAMEWORK ON ETHOS

ETB Patron's Framework on Ethos was launched on November 23rd. The framework, which was developed by ETBI and the Centre for Evaluation, Quality and Inspection at Dublin City University (DCU), will support all ETB schools in living out their ethos. The Framework applies to the Community National Schools and Community Colleges under the patronage of ETBs.

Professor Anne Looney, Executive Dean of Dublin City University's Institute of Education delivered the keynote speech at the event, and Carl O'Brien, Education Editor at the Irish Times, was the moderator of a panel discussion on the theme 'Ethos in Action', featuring staff, learners and parents from across the ETB sector on the practical use of the ethos Framework. DDLETB were excellently represented by Mariam Sleyum a parent, and Yasmin Aminou, a past pupil of Lucan Community College. The launch of the ETBI Patrons' Framework on Ethos reaffirms the fantastic work that is happening in all of our schools, in particular the innovations in learning and teaching, our inclusive practices and most importantly our commitment to both excellence in education and equality. The Framework also provides our schools with a structured way of reflecting on their practices.

It is hoped that schools will find this Framework extremely affirming while also enabling them to identify areas where they could live out their core values more effectively.

This Framework is the culmination of ten years of extensive national consultation, research and visionary policymaking. It articulates for the first time what it means to be an ETB school. The launch of this document is a historic day for the ETB school community. <image>

# ETBI DELIGHTED TO SUPPORT ACTIVE CONSENT AWARENESS WEEK.

### November 28th – December 2nd highlighted Active Consent Awareness Week which was developed by NUI Galway and proudly supported by ETB Ireland.

### **#FETisStartingHere**

Consent is defined as – an agreement to do something or give permission. In the context of sex, a person is giving full consent/is consenting when they freely and actively agree to do something sexual with someone else; however, the person still has the right to change their mind at any point.

A person is NOT consenting if they do not actively agree, have been forced or pressured in some way or are in a state where they are incapable of full consent (such as when asleep, under the influence of drugs or alcohol, or below the age of consent).

According to the Criminal Law (Sexual Offences) Act 2017, we consent to a sexual act if we "freely and voluntarily" agree to it. Active\* Consent summarises this as: Consent is **Ongoing**, **Mutual**, and **Freely-Given**.



## ETBI has facilitated the training of FET staff in conjunction with Active\* Consent and NUI Galway.

There is also a second-level **Teacher Training** to support teachers in facilitating and delivering the *Active\* Consent for School Communities* programme in classrooms, along with second-level **Parents' Seminars** for participating schools and **First Point of Contact Training** in partnership with Galway Rape Crisis Centre.

CONSENT MATTERS

This training provides participants with the skills and knowledge to deal appropriately with a disclosure of sexual violence, and increase awareness of the causes and effects of sexual violence.

# **EAL UPDATES** CERTIFICATION OF EAL TEACHERS

24 teachers from 24 different DDLETB and non-DDLETB schools were trained in June 2022 and have just received their internationally recognised certification from Cambridge English. In keeping with our ethos, the certification of this new cohort of teachers continues DDLETB's focus on quality and Excellence in Education in the area of EAL. Courses to train up teachers to teach EAL have been taking place in DDLETB for the past 17 years.

The next course will take place intensively over  $32\frac{1}{2}$  hours week beginning  $19^{th}$  June 2023. All welcome.

# CPD FOR Fet tutors/ Teachers



24 FET teachers from DDLETB and KWETB have completed online training in Content and Language Integrated Learning (CLIL) to be able to support students from a migrant/ refugee background in their classes. Course participants teach Healthcare, Childcare among other courses and have seen an increase in Ukrainians among other refugees and Asylum Seekers register for their FET courses A similar CPD course will take place in January for post primary subject teachers who have EAL students in their classes. The course will be hosted by Swords CC with 4 x 2-hour face-to-face sessions, a mock exam corrected in Cambridge and a live exam which will take place on the school premises. Exam and certification costs are covered for teachers in DDLETB schools to ensure maximum take up.

### **DONABATE CC SCHOOL OF SANCTUARY JOURNEY**

In October, Donabate CC started its journey to become a School of Sanctuary. It is the first DDLETB school to seek this status. 8 students and staff in Donabate CC signed a School of Sanctuary pledge to support the City of Sanctuary vision that Ireland will be a welcoming place of safety for all, and to offer sanctuary to people fleeing violence and persecution by committing to:

- · LEARN (about refugees and migrants),
- ACT, (doing things to promote inclusion and migrants)
- SHARING this information (with anyone willing to hear about it).

After signing this pledge, Karen Dervan and colleagues from the City of Sanctuary initiative were invited to Donabate CC. They met with the students and teachers to discuss their upcoming journey. Attendees discussed how to create a culture of welcome for refugees, migrants and anyone needing sanctuary in the school as well as how to educate themselves on different cultures through cuisine, language, fashion, etc. These discussions offered an insight into what DCC already does well, for example the work around the inclusion of the LGBTQIA+ community and Mental Health awareness.

At the main entrance to Donabate CC, greetings in different languages are now on display. Doors to the rest rooms also display different languages. A group of committed students meet every week to discuss ways to make Donabate CC a more welcoming school for refugees and migrants. From 12<sup>th</sup> to 16<sup>th</sup> December, the school will be celebrating its first ever Human Rights week. Activities include donating Christmas presents to children living in direct provision, inviting Schools of Sanctuary ambassadors to the school and visiting DCU to share and collaborate.

This initiative demonstrates DDLETB's core values of Care and Community. Well done to the DP, John Doyle and teacher, Josephine Nyamuranga who are leading this initiative.

## **ALICE'S TOP TIPS**

for supporting students with ADDHD

### 3 SIMPLE STRATEGIES TO INCLUDE IN CLASSES

#### MOVEMENT

As many schools have adopted the one-hour classes, planning movement in lessons is vital to students. Movement can be incorporated into different T&L strategies such as walking debates, popcorn questions, learning galleries, and freeze frames. You can also use mind breaks for movements, such as chair push ups, palm presses, hand chains, and wall push ups. Brain breaks keep students alert, while also creating a pause for the learning to sink in.

#### CONNECTION

1

Students with ADHD can struggle to manage their emotions and motivation. Microsoft Reflect APP is a great tool to connect with students. It also supports students in leaning to manage their emotions and therefore improve their attitude towards learning. The app, available for teams, allows you to ask students questions to assess their mood. You post the check-in on your class teams, from a premade question or you can edit the prompt to suit a learning experience. Students answer by selecting the emotion visually, then selecting the word that best connects to their emotion and attitude. It helps students by building their vocabulary around emotions, making them aware their own feelings, and giving them the opportunity to voice this. You can collect student data on how students are 'checking in' and use it to inform student-centred planning or interventions needed. Students can see their data and help them identify patterns.



#### CHOICE



Students with ADHD can struggle to concentrate in class and this can lead to disengagement. A way to combat this is to provide students with more choices. By facilitating student's agency we encourage them to take ownership of their learning. Students who are presented with more choices in class around tasks, assessments and modes of work, will be more engaged. When these students have more choice in what they do, the learning process feels more authentic to them. You can give choice through, choice boards, 'should, could, must', work stations, flexible seating, output options (video, Sway, poster, PPT, handwritten), and many more...choices! #UDL

It is one of ten locations around the country given the green light to make plans to develop a College of The Future (COTF) to the next stage for capital investment. The project envisages a state-of-the-art, green further education campus built in Swords with a proposal to serve 1,000 full-time students and up to 5,000 part-time students and is a significant milestone for the Fingal area.

### Speaking at the event in Youthreach Swords. Minister Harris said:

"This is a brilliant day for Dublin Fingal. It has been chosen as one of ten locations to proceed to develop their proposal for a further education College of the Future.

This is one of Ireland's fastest growing areas and this proposed purpose-built Further Education College will help drive the region and will help it prepare the region with the skillset it needs to deliver for the people of Dublin Fingal. The College of the Future Major Projects Fund will support the implementation of the vision set out in the Further Education Strategy. This Fund, and the proposed for development in Swords has the potential to deliver on a range of strategic objectives. It is great that the proposal will now proceed to Preliminary Business Case Stage."

DDLETB are leading the project and our Chief Executive Caitríona Murphy welcomed the decision and added that:

"Building on existing Further Education and Training provision across Fingal to meet the growing and diverse needs of stakeholders in this area has been a priority for DDLETB for some time. This approval to proceed to the next stage of proposal development in Further Education and Training is very welcome and will enable us to deliver on our ambitions for the people of Fingal and surrounding areas".

# The Adult Literacy for Life Strategy



Hi everyone, I am Sinéad Hyland and I recently took up a new role in DDLETB as Regional Literacy Coordinator. Based in Head Office, the aim of my role is to increase the number of learners engaging with literacy and language support as well as programmes which aim to support people with numeracy, English language and digital skills needs.

I work under the Adult Literacy for Life (ALL) Strategy which aims to ensure that everyone feels included and enabled fully in society, in the workplace and in their daily lives. ALL acknowledges that modern literacy skills are essential in leading a healthy, fulfilling, and productive life. Improvements in confidence and self-esteem are the result of improvements in literacy skills which enables fuller participation in community, society and economy and raises social and political capital.

This is, very obviously, not something that I can achieve without the help of many within DDLETB and beyond. A key motivation behind the development of the ALL strategy was to embed a more connected system that could meet the wide range of complex individual needs in a simpler and more accessible manner.



At the moment, I am working with the four excellent Adult Education Services across the county and will broaden the scope of the project to other areas of DDLETB so we can serve all those who have unmet literacy and numeracy needs who engage with us in education. We will also encourage others to join them and take the first step to address gaps in literacy and numeracy.

The ALL Strategy will work across all FET- in and between ETBs - and takes a Cross-Government, Cross-Society, Cross-Economy Approach. My role will have a 'clear partnership, cross-organisation remit'. This will allow ETBs to take on more of an outreach, partnership-based role within the local community. We will build on the existing links with local schools, community groups, initiatives and resource centres. There is a Regional Literacy Coordinator in each of the 16 ETBs so the strategy can be effective across the country.

### All Strategy Structures



In a nutshell, the ALL Strategy is an ambitious long-term strategy with targets achievable by building on what is in place, sharing ideas, innovations, and good practice. The strategy is underpinned by commitment, drive, partnership and collaboration of learners, educators, and wider society.
