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Celebrating ETB Week 2025: A Showcase of Excellence and Community Spirit

ETB Week 2025 (March 24th – 28th) was a fantastic celebration of the growth and achievements of our learners, as well as the dedication and passion of our wonderful staff and communities from all 16 ETB's.

DDLETB were delighted to participate and witness the incredible events happening across our schools, colleges, and centres, along with the other 15 ETBs around the country. This special week highlighted the strength of our educational network and the transformative impact of education and training in communities nationwide. From engaging workshops, events, and creative showcases to inspiring stories of personal growth, ETB Week truly embodies the spirit of lifelong learning.

Dublin & Dún Laoghaire ETB was especially proud to have 3 shortlisted entries to the prestigious ETB Excellence Awards which took place on March 27th in Croke Park. Scooping a national award, a runner up prize and the judges praise, we certainly enjoyed the celebrations!

Two students from Coláiste de hÍde scooped the national 2025 Excellence in Irish language Education Award for an after-school Irish language club they set up in a Tallaght primary school where 40% of the school population was born outside of Ireland. Greenhills Community College Teacher and AEN Co-ordinator, Ciaran Stone was a runner-up in the Excellence in Equality category for his project to further

support students with additional needs and former Adamstown Community College learner and human rights activist Grace Oladipo was also shortlisted for the ETB Hero award and praised by the judges.

The Awards, hosted by former ETB learner and RTE Newsreader Ray Kennedy and featuring a special musical performance by former ETB student and singer-songwriter Tolü Makay, highlighted learner and staff excellence across primary, secondary, further education & training, and youth services.


Opening the event and addressing over 200 staff and learners from across Ireland's ETBs, Minister for Further and Higher Education, Research, Innovation and Science, James Lawless TD said: "Congratulations on winning an ETB Excellence Award. Your dedication reminds us that education is not just about what we learn, it is about what we become. It is about pushing limits, breaking barriers, and striving for excellence every single day. My department is committed to removing barriers to education and ensuring that opportunities are available to all—regardless of background, age, or circumstance. The Excellence Awards were the flagship event for ETB Week 2025, which also included the launch of a landmark book on ETBs edited by former Education Editor of the Irish Independent Katherine Donnelly: Education & Training Boards: Shaping the Future, leaving no one behind; Muintearas'25: a groundbreaking event bringing ETB Irish-medium schools together for the first time to celebrate and commit to inclusive Irish medium education; and many events across the 16 ETBs to promote their services.

Speaking at the awards, Paddy Lavelle, ETBI's General Secretary stated: "These core values are not a given in today's world, indeed they are increasingly contested.

Gradam Sármhaitheasa sa Ghaeloideachas

Comhghairdeas ó chroí le hEibhlín Ní Bhroin agus Saoirse Nic Cárthaigh, daltaí idirbhliana Choláise de hÍde agus buaiteoirí an Gradam Sármhaitheasa sa Ghaeloideachas ag na Gradam ETBI le déanaí. Tá pobal Choláiste de hÍde an-bhródúil as an obair atá ar siúl ag na cailíní an Ghaeilge a chur chun cinn ina gceantar.

Bhunaigh Eibhlín agus Saoirse club iar-scoile i dTamhlacht darbh ainm 'Na Doirse Oscailte' mar chuid de thionscnamh idirbhliana agus é mar sprioc fhoriomlán acu feiceálacht agus úsáid na Gaeilge i dTamhlacht a mhéadú. D'aithin Eibhlín agus Saoirse go raibh teifigh agus inimircigh in aois bunscoile ag streachailt i mbunscoileanna na hÉireann mar nach raibh aon teagmháil acu leis an nGaeilge ná leis an gcultúr Gaelach roimhe seo. Thapaigh siad an deis spás a chruthú dóibh siúd a tháinig go hÉirinn le comhtháthú i dTamhlacht agus mothú muintearais ar bhealach spraíúil agus neamhshrianta. Bhunaigh Eibhlín agus Saoirse an club iar-scoile i mbunscoil áitiúil inar rugadh 40% de dhaonra na scoile lasmuigh d'Éirinn. Cheap Eibhlín agus Saoirse cuspóir féintreoraithe don chlub, ag díriú ar fhoghlaim trí spraoi agus spreagadh le cluichí teanga agus foghlaim chinéiteach, seachas béim ar ghramadach agus ar chruinneas sa Ghaeilge. Tá dhá chlub iar-scoile anois oscailte acu i gColáiste de hÍde le béim ar aistriú ón mbunscoil go dtí an meánscoil agus caidreas sa chéad bhliain. Comhghairdeas leo arís ar a ngaisce, tá sé tuillte go mór acu, agus bunluachanna an chúraim, an mheasa, an phobail agus an chomhionannais ag croílár na hoibre ag Eibhlín agus Saoirse.

Comhghairdeas ó chroí le hEibhlín Ní Bhroin and Saoirse Nic Cárthaigh, Coláiste de hÍde TY students and winners of the Gradam Sármhaitheasa sa Ghaeloideachas at the recent ETBI Awards. The school community is very proud of the work the girls have done promoting the Irish language in Tallaght.

'Na Doirse Oscailte' is an after-school club in Tallaght established by Eibhlín and Saoirse as part of a transition year initiative with the overall goal of



increasing the visibility and use of the Irish language in Tallaght. Eibhlín and Saoirse acknowledged that refugees and immigrants of primary school age were struggling in Irish primary schools as they had no previous contact with the Irish language or culture. Eibhlín and Saoirse took the opportunity to create a space for those who had newly come to Ireland to integrate into the community in Tallaght and to feel a sense of belonging in a playful and unrestricted way. Eibhlín and Saoirse founded the after-school club in a local primary school where 40% of the school population was born outside of Ireland. Eibhlín and Saoirse devised a selfled ethos and objective for the club, focusing on learning through fun and motivation using linguistic games and kinetic learning, rather than emphasis on grammar and accuracy in Irish. The girls have since opened two after-school clubs in Coláiste de hÍde, with emphasis on transitioning from primary to post-primary school and friendships in first year. Congratulations again to Eibhlín agus Saoirse on their award, it is well deserved. and the core values of care, respect, community and equality are at the heart of their work

Ciaran Stone Shortlisted for ETB Award for Equality



Over the past few years, Greenhills Community College in Walkinstown, Dublin 12 has made remarkable progress in creating a truly inclusive and supportive environment for all students.

Guided by Principal Noirín Lannon and Deputy Principal Geraldine Leahy, the school has enhanced its facilities with updated Support Rooms (Rooms 8, 9 and 11), a fully equipped Sensory Room and a Games Room featuring two PlayStation 5 consoles and an annual FIFA tournament. The newly improved Kitchen now supports the practical L2LP Cooking for Life programme, and a Polytunnel allows students to grow and cook their own produce.

A new AEN Locker Room helps students organise their days with personalised timetables and provides support whenever needed. The dedicated Reading Room, part of the school's DEIS initiatives, nurtures literacy skills and fosters a lifelong love of reading.

The AEN Support Team, led by AEN Coordinator Ciaran Stone and comprising Louise Scully, Iona Brady, Cian Dunne, Sophie Whelan, Liadan O'Riordan and Samantha Finn, ensures that students with additional needs receive specialised assistance and remain integrated in mainstream classes. All teachers at Greenhills Community College demonstrate a deep commitment to student wellbeing, working closely with the SNA team, whose invaluable support helps maintain a positive atmosphere for learning and personal growth.

Ciaran was nominated by his colleagues for the ETB Award of Equality and was shortlisted by ETB and independent judges. The work of Ciaran and the team at Greenhills Community College is a true example of our ETB Ethos in Action and our strong commitment to supporting excellence in education for all students. Huge well done to Ciaran and the entire team at Greenhills CC.









Special Recognition for Adamstown CC Past-Learner

Meet Grace Oladipo: A Trailblazing Social Entrepreneur and Human Rights Advocate

Grace Oladipo is an award-winning social entrepreneur, international speaker, and human rights advocate. Her journey from Nigeria to Ireland is marked by determination and purpose.

Arriving in Ireland at age eight, Grace attended Adamstown Community College, where she took on leadership roles, including Head Girl. After her Leaving Certificate results shifted her away from studying Medicine, she pursued a Bachelor of Civil Law at UCD's Sutherland School of Law.

At UCD, Grace embraced leadership as the International Students Campaign Coordinator and Auditor of the Livingstones Christian Society. She co-founded the university's first Gospel choir and Jamie's Friends, an initiative supporting Dublin's homeless community. Their "Party for the Homeless" event gained significant recognition in 2019.



Grace received the Arthur Cox Contribution to University Life Award and the UCD President's Award. During a year abroad at the University of Sheffield, she developed a project creating school shoes from banana fibers for Nigerian children, winning the 2019 Unilever UK Individual Purpose Award. Her dissertation on female imprisonment further demonstrated her commitment to social reform.

After graduating, Grace joined PwC as a Tax Trainee before earning a Fulbright and George Moore Scholarship to pursue a master's in International Human Rights Law at the University of Notre Dame. She graduated in 2022 with multiple academic honors and served as the LL.M. Representative in the Student Bar Association, while also anchoring the university's ND Sunrise TV station.





She later attended The Hague Academy of International Law on scholarship and interned at the UN Office of the High Commissioner for Human Rights in Geneva, where her education video on human rights reached over 100,000 viewers.

In May 2023, Grace returned to Ireland as a UN Policy Officer at the Department of Foreign Affairs, supporting the UN Youth Delegate Programme, Ireland's engagement at UNGA High-Level Week, and the campaign for the Human Rights Council 2027–2029 term.

A published co-author of Equity in the Workplace: Stories of Black Irish Women in Ireland, Grace is an active voice for ethnic minority women. She is currently a Trainee Solicitor at Arthur Cox LLP and the Founder and Project Director of Audacity XX, an initiative breaking down professional barriers for women from minority and disadvantaged backgrounds. Selected for Social Entrepreneurs Ireland's Ideas Academy, Grace is committed to using her legal career to amplify marginalised voices and bring lasting change.

DDLETB were delighted to welcome Grace and her husband to the ETB Awards as a shortlisted candidate for the ETB Hero Award. Although Grace lost out to a very worthy winner, Sean Boyle from Donegal ETB, her story remains truly inspirational. Her journey is one of resilience, purpose, and impact, and we are incredibly proud of all she that has achieved. Grace's work continues to inspire others and will no doubt leave a lasting mark on the world.



MUINTEARAS'25 A celebration of Gaeilge

Dírigh MUINTEARAS'25 ar an ionchuimsiú i ngach gné de shaol na scoile, ag ceiliúradh na héagsúlachta i scoileanna BOO lán-Ghaeilge. Chothaigh an ócáid comhráite agus comhpháirtíochtaí idir na toscaireachtaí de dhaltaí, múinteoirí, agus pobail scoile ar cheartas, chothromas agus féiniúlacht chultúrtha, chomh maith le tacaíocht agus rannpháirtíocht do dhaltaí a bhfuil riachtanais foghlama nó riachtanais bhreise acu. Deis a bhí ann naisc a chruthú agus oideachas a cheiliúradh mar eispéireas ionchuimsitheach do chách.

Ba cheiliúradh agus athdhearbhú é MUINTEARAS'25 ar thiomantas an ETBI do thimpeallachtaí foghlama ionchuimsitheacha agus tacúla a chothú. Agus an ócáid ag críochnú, rug na toscaireachtaí fís chomhroinnte úr leo do thodhchaí na Gaelscolaíochta. Thug an Chomhairle um Oideachas Gaeltachta agus Gaelscolaíochta (COGG) tacaíocht don ócáid.

Chuir daltaí a gcuid oibre i láthair ag taispeáint conas a bhreathnaíonn ionchuimsiú ina scoil, roinn siad pleananna don todhchaí, agus ghlac siad páirt i bplé idirghníomhach le piaraí agus aoichainteoirí. Bhí scoileanna san iomaíocht le haghaidh duaischiste €2,000, a bronnadh ar na tionscnaimh is nuálaí agus is mó tionchair. Bhí ionadaíocht ag iar-bhunscoileanna lán-Ghaeilge DDLETB in Áth Luain agus bhuaigh Coláiste Cois Life an duais, tar éis dóibh a bpóstaer a chur i láthair ag an seisiún iomlánach.

Cé nár bhaineamar an duais, bhaineamar an-leas as an lá. Thug póstaer Choláiste na Tulchann léargas ar an gcaoi a gcruthaímid deiseanna ionchuimsitheacha chun rochtain ar an nGaeilge a mhéadú inár scoil, ar fud champas CP Luttrellstown agus i mBaile Átha Cliath 15. Leagadh amach ann na gníomhartha a dhéanaimid chun an Ghaeilge a chur chun cinn mar theanga inrochtana, bheo, ábhartha a úsáidtear i gcomhthéacs uirbeach.

Leis na h-óráidí spreagúla, na díospóireachtaí painéil idirghníomhacha, agus an taispeántas póstaeir, ba dheis iontach é MUINTEARAS'25 chun foghlaim ó scoileanna eile, inspioráid a fháil, agus ionchuimsiú san oideachas a cheiliúradh, agus as Gaeilge!







The focus of MUINTEARAS'25, which translates to "Community", "kinship", "friendship" in English, was on inclusion in all aspects of school life, celebrating the diversity within Irish-medium ETB schools (Gaelscoileanna and Gaelcholáistí).

The event, which took place during the ETB Week celebrations, fostered conversations and partnerships among students, teachers, and school communities on equity and cultural identity, as well as support and engagement for students with additional learning needs or disabilities. It was an opportunity to create connections and celebrate education as an inclusive experience for all.

MUINTEARAS'25 was not just a celebration but a reaffirmation of the ETBI's commitment to fostering inclusive and supportive learning environments. As the event concluded, attendees left with a renewed sense of community and a shared vision for the future of Irish-medium education. The event was supported by An Chomhairle um Oideachas Gaeltachta agus Gaelscolaíochta (COGG).

Students presented their work showcasing how inclusion looks in their school, shared future plans, and participated in interactive discussions with peers and guest speakers. Schools competed for a prize fund of €2,000, awarded to the most innovative and impactful initiatives. All of DDLETB's Irish-medium post-primary schools/ Gaelcholásití were represented at the event in Athlone and Coláiste Cois Life won a prize, after a lively, engaging presentation of their poster at the plenary session.

Coláiste na Tulchann's (Aonad Lán Gaeilge, located on the Luttrellstown CC campus) poster presented an insight on how we create inclusive opportunities for increasing access to Gaeilge in our school, across the Luttrellstown CC campus and in Dublin 15. It outlined actions the school engage in to promote the Irish language as an accessible, living, relevant language that is actually used in an urban context.

The inspiring speeches, interactive panel discussions, and the poster exhibition, made MUINTEARAS'25 a fantastic opportunity to learn from other schools, gain inspiration, and celebrate inclusion in education, and as Gaeilge!





DDLETB Launches Pioneering Ethos Ambassador Programme

DDLETB is proud to lead the way nationally with the launch of the Ethos Ambassador Programme – the first initiative of its kind in Ireland. This groundbreaking programme places student voice and leadership at its very heart, empowering young people to take strong, active roles in promoting and developing the ethos of their schools.





The programme is built on a values-led approach, where teams of student ambassadors – selected locally in each school from 1st to 5th year – participate in a transformative journey of learning, collaboration, and action. Ambassadors engage in two in-person workshops focused on the core values of the DDLETB ethos framework, take part in an interschool meetup, and complete a school-based development project rooted in these shared values.

Upon completion, schools are awarded the Core Values Flag, a symbol of their commitment to living the ethos in everyday school life.

Each ambassador is supported throughout their journey by a dedicated link teacher and a specially developed Ethos Ambassador Reflection Journal – a bespoke resource designed for DDLETB schools and fully aligned with the Patron's Framework on Ethos.

The programme has already received an overwhelmingly positive response, with schools across the organisation embracing the opportunity to embed ethos in meaningful, student-led ways. It clearly resonates with where our schools are on their ethos journey and signals a powerful shift in how we nurture school culture through leadership and student agency.

The Ethos Ambassador Programme is more than a new initiative – it is a movement, and DDLETB is proud to be at the forefront and ready to raise the Core Values Flag!

A Year of European Visits and Welcomes!



A Celebration of Growth and Collaboration.



Celebrating Teacher Leadership: A Showcase of Innovation and Achievement



We were delighted to welcome back the TLP (Teacher Leadership Programme) this year following its 'Reflect and Review' phase. This year, teams from 22 schools took part in the year-long programme, which supports school development and builds leadership capacity among non-positional teachers. Through a practical, project-based approach, the TLP empowers teachers to work collaboratively. explore educational leadership, and drive meaningful change in their schools or centres. Each session is aligned with the LAOS 2022 framework and equips participants with the skills to lead school development projects that contribute to strategic improvement. Highlights of the programme included sessions on teamwork, leadership, student voice, and collaborative project design.

The spirit of innovation and collaboration was alive and well at the recent celebration marking the culmination of the programme. The event brought together educators from across the region to showcase their poster projects, highlighting the impactful work carried out throughout the programme. It also served as a graduation ceremony, where participants were formally recognised and presented with certificates of completion in honour of their dedication and achievement.

22 projects were showcased on the evening and were a testament to the dedication of the TLP teams who worked on school development projects throughout the year. Each project was an example of the commitment to excellence in education within the school community.

A particular highlight of the event was the announcement of the Projects of Excellence Awards, recognising outstanding contributions to teaching and learning.

First place was awarded to Castleknock Community College for their inspiring project "Smart Schools: Shaping the Future with Al." This initiative explored the responsible and effective integration of Al in schools, aiming to support both students and staff in adapting to emerging technologies.







Second place went to a collaborative project between Swords Community College and Coláiste Pobail Fóla, which focused on developing Universal Design for Learning (UDL) resources across multiple subjects. This crossschool partnership exemplified the power of collaboration in enhancing inclusive education.

Third place was awarded to Coláiste Cois Life for their project "Pointing Towards Progress: Enhancing Student Effort and Recognition on VS Ware." Their innovative approach aimed to boost student motivation by improving how effort and achievement are acknowledged and communicated through digital platforms.

The event was a fitting celebration of teacher leadership, showcasing the creativity, commitment, and collaboration at the heart of educational progress. Congratulations to all participants for their inspiring work and for making a lasting impact on their school communities.

New Year Head Support and Development Programme at DDLETB



Following the success of last year's pilot, the DDLETB Year Head Support and Development Programme officially launched this year with participation from 27 post-primary schools across the organisation. This exciting new initiative is designed to support and empower Year Heads in their vital middle leadership role, providing structured opportunities to learn, reflect, and grow together.

Learning from Each Other, Growing Together

One of the programme's key strengths is its emphasis on peer learning and collaboration. Year Heads from across DDLETB came together to share their experiences, challenges and successes, and to build meaningful professional networks.

Before the programme began, participants engaged in pre-programme preparation, using their newly designed and dedicated (to the YH programme), Leadership Connect Reflection Journals to reflect on their current practice, set personal learning targets, and outline what they hoped to gain from the experience.

The sessions (2 online sessions and 4 inperson) were practical, reflective and grounded in the real experiences of Year Heads. Core topics included:

- The Role of the Year Head: responsibilities, influence, and daily realities
- Leading and working with a team (other Year Head, Senior Leadership and tutors)
- School avoidance, Attendance issues and causes, and supporting vulnerable students
- Difficult conversations, conflict avoidance and management strategies
- Reflective practice and emotional intelligence/ Leadership
- Understanding the Year Head as a middle leader – role and responsibilities

Each session included opportunities for role play, real-life scenarios, group discussion, and structured reflection and review using our newly designed Leadership Connect Reflection Journal.

At the conclusion of the programme, participants revisited their personal targets and engaged in an online check-in session and post-programme reflection, helping them consolidate learning and plan for next steps. They were also encouraged to bring their learning back to their own schools, sharing ideas, strategies and resources with fellow Year Heads. To further support this, a dedicated Teams group was set up where resources, presentations and support materials were shared.

The feedback from participants has been overwhelmingly positive. Year Heads appreciated the practical focus, collaborative approach, and the chance to develop new tools and strategies to support their leadership journey.

Programme Co-ordinator Janet Murphy expressed her delight at how well the initiative has been received:

School Summit

Learners thoroughly enjoyed the School Summit, where they had the opportunity to connect with a wide range of employers, colleges, and training providers. This evidence-based programme is designed to promote positive mental health, build resilience, and prevent substance misuse among young people. Through a series of interactive workshops and group activities, students explored important topics such as peer pressure, decision-making, emotional wellbeing, and self-confidence. The programme encouraged open discussion, reflection, and skill-building, empowering learners to make informed and healthy life choices. Feedback from participants was overwhelmingly positive, with many expressing a greater sense of awareness and confidence in managing real-life challenges.



We are thrilled to announce the successful launch of the iVET (Introduction to Vocational **Education and Training) module across three DDLETB schools—Adamstown Community College**, **Greenhills Community College, and St Kevins Community College. The DDLETB Fundamental** Home Maintenance and Skills iVET Module Programme is an educational initiative designed to provide students with practical skills and knowledge in plumbing and heating systems. The module aims to connect theory to practical application, offering insight into further education and training opportunities, such as apprenticeship programmes. By introducing learners to vocational pathways early, it opens doors to careers they might not have otherwise considered.

The programme includes hands-on workshops at the Tallaght Training Centre, where students can apply their learning in a real-world setting. Additionally, partnerships with CJK and Chadwick's offer students career talks, work experience, and interview workshops.



These collaborations aim to educate students about the construction industry and apprenticeships, providing a pathway to future employment. A huge thank you to the dedicated staff and students who are bringing this programme to life, and to our industry partners, CJK Engineering and Chadwick's, for their continued support and collaboration.

Recently, the iVET initiative received national recognition in The Irish Times. The article, titled "The Dublin school challenging our university-first mindset with an apprenticeship taster course", showcased DDLETB's leadership in promoting vocational pathways. Adult Literacy Methodologies Spring 2025

It was with great delight, therefore, that we welcomed 21 of them to the 'Introduction to Adult Literacy Methodologies' programme between March and April. This was a very enthusiastic group with specialisms in a variety of subject areas from ESOL to community education. They were interested in knowing more about teaching adult literacy, numeracy and digital literacy so the programme was specially designed with them in mind. Our highly experienced team of Adult Literacy Organisers and Literacy Tutors facilitated the 18-hour programme which covered a range of topics including assessment and developing resources.

Two sessions were delivered in-person on a Saturday while the remaining workshops took place online on weekday afternoons. Many of the participants completed an end-of-programme assignment with a view to joining the adult literacy teams if the opportunity arises.

FET Leadership Development Initiative Summer 2025

It is often said that leadership is about making a difference and since 2019 we have been trying to support our FET leaders as they make a difference to their teams and their learners. The title of this year's Leadership Development Programme is 'Future Focus' and between April and May, 15 members of the FET Leadership Team attended a series of workshops. These focused on optimising team roles, developing the team and re-imagining work to strengthen the team's purpose.

The sessions were facilitated by Subject Matter Expert Tracy O'Brien, a psychologist, former HR Director and experienced trainer. The participants appreciated the mixture of theoretical insights and practical tools. Opportunities for reflection and discussion further strengthened the group as a community of practice. The programme also includes a semester abroad and a work placement, ensuring graduates are well-prepared for real-world challenges.

Pride for Sallynoggin College of Further Education and DDLETB

Irish photojournalist, Ivor Prickett, has won a Pulitzer Prize as part of a New York Times team recognised for its powerful coverage of the civil war in Sudan. While his name is now known globally, Prickett's journey began much closer to home — at Sallynoggin College of Further Education (SCFE).

It was at SCFE that Prickett first discovered his passion for photography. Unsure of his future after school, he enrolled in a photography course that offered hands-on training, real-world assignments, and an encouraging atmosphere that sparked his creativity. He credits the college and his photography teacher Joe Sterling, with setting him on a path that would lead to international recognition.

Ivor's SCFE photography project documenting Duffy's Circus earned him a place on a prestigious documentary photography course in Wales, opening doors to an international career.

His big break came in 2012, when he captured portraits of Iraqi refugees and a striking image of war correspondent Marie Colvin in Tahrir Square, taken shortly before her death. The image was published around the world, establishing Prickett as a leading voice in conflict photojournalism. Now based in Istanbul, he has spent over a decade documenting life in conflict zones. Though previously nominated, this is his first Pulitzer win — a proud moment not only for Irish journalism but for SCFE and the Further Education sector that helped launch his career.

Reflecting on 10 Years of Digital Development at DDLETB

To peel back the layers of time ten years to 2013, to the dawn of DDLETB, one would find the digital landscape presenting itself in stark contrast to now. Many primary, secondary and FET colleges were using paper registers and posting home paper results. There were even still some acetates and floppy disks floating on desks.

The installing of the first Interactve Whiteboards from 2008 was a huge catalyst of change as most of the technology in schools prior to this was used for administrative purposes only. In ten years since, technology has become integral to the day-to-day running of our world and our education system and in fact, there are now more mobile phones on the planet than people.

In 2015 as part of their Digital Strategy for Schools, the Department of Education recognised the significance of technological advancements and began issuing grants to schools for ICT infrastructure. The current strategy runs until 2027, at which stage, the strategy will have provided over €310 million in ICT infrastructure grants to schools. There has also been an investment of €13 million annually

to improve broadband connection in schools in recent years. DDLETB's Wi-Fi infrastructure has evolved from ad-hoc deployments prior to 2014 to Generation 4 Aruba today. The next step is the move to Generation 5, which will encompass a fully, cloud-based infrastructure where cybersecurity takes front stage. This is all thanks to the hard work of our dedicated DDLETB IT Department and the support of IT Coordinators in schools, colleges and centres.

In ten years, technology has become integral to the running of our complex nexus * whether it be through the monitoring of student attendance through VS Ware and other applications, the utilisation of MIT for online admissions to staff collaboration on SharePoint. Technology has also played an instrumental role in improving the effectiveness of teaching and learning. Once, displaying diagrams on an interactive whiteboard was considered progressive. Technology has now transformed our classrooms into multimodal, immersive learning environments, where students learning about volcanoes can watch a live volcanic eruption taking place on the other side of the world with a few mouse clicks.

In 2018, DDLETB selected Microsoft as their preferred platform and began using Teams and Office 365. However, it wasn't widely deployed until the Covid 19 pandemic. Overnight Teams became essential in enabling teaching, learning and assessment to continue remotely and for continuing to connect with both learners and staff. The ICT Team, Digital Leaders and Digital Development Officer worked tirelessly to inform and upskill parents, students and teachers on the platform during this challenging time and greatly appreciated the support and work of the school, college and centre TEL/Digital Teams.

DDLETB's first one-to-one school where both students and teachers used the same devices for a new learning approach was Donabate Community College. DDLETB now boasts 15 one-to-one schools and 10,000 iPads with 2,000 new mobile devices added each year. Add to that, 850 printers and additional technological supports for learners with additional educational needs, and you have an IT infrastructure that has a footprint of a very large university. Supporting this framework is a huge daily undertaking, but DDLETB recognise the importance of digital technology in all education settings, allowing all learners to be

at the centre of their own learning journey and to develop skills that are essential to modern workplaces and society.

A substantial technological success for DDLETB Schools is our Digital Connect Programme. Every year, schools are selected to propose a project to improve the learner experience through technology. In 2023, Rathdara CC utilised funding for the programme and donations from various companies to increase device capacity for learners and to develop a state-of-the-art STEM room for students to explore their skills. In 2022, St. Kevin's CC transitioned fully to a 1-1 school to equip students with greater digital skills and break down unequal cost barriers.

At DDLETB, we pride ourselves on our commitment to innovation in digital education. We stay abreast of emerging educational technologies and proactively move with the times to ensure our learners and educators are equipped for the future. By embracing change and continuously evolving, we create a dynamic, forward-thinking learning environment that supports success in a digital world.



The DDLETB network contains a vast number of expert Digital Leaders who work together to provide ongoing CPD and support to all staff on various aspects of maximising Digital Teaching and Learning. DDLETB boasts two Apple schools of distinction and two Microsoft distinguished schools with numerous STEM rooms, as well as Digital Hubs. There is even a Data Centre in Collinstown Park, which assists in training the next generation of data analysts.

Looking to the future, technology, AI, Virtual Reality and even gaming will be at the heart of the Irish education system and DDLETB's strategy will continue to drive and support change. By exploring the possibilities together, our learners will be better equipped to meet the needs of the diverse, digital workforce of the future and thrive in an ever-evolving global landscape. Collinstown Park Community College Celebrating 40 Years



As part of its ongoing commitment to improvement, the OSD team is currently planning multiple projects aimed at enhancing IT security, improving customer service, supporting staff integration, promoting energy conservation, and advancing sustainability. Here's a closer look at some of the key projects that we are currently working on:

Strengthening Cybersecurity through Software License Upgrades

Recognising the critical importance of robust cybersecurity, the OSD team is in the process of planning a comprehensive software license upgrade from the Microsoft A3 to A5 licence. This initiative aims to modernise the organisation's digital infrastructure and enhance security protocols, reducing the risk of IT security breaches and ensuring compliance with the latest cybersecurity standards. This proactive approach reflects the team's commitment to safeguarding sensitive information and maintaining operational continuity.

Customer Action Plan for Enhanced Service Delivery

This plan will outline clear strategies for delivering exceptional service, including training, performance monitoring, and feedback mechanisms. 
